
Village Québécois d'Antan




Musée du Bronze d'Inverness



The Bécancour tourist route is a wonderful way to explore our region, with its beautiful scenery and many attractions. Here's a route you can take to visit some of the must-see spots. It'll make your trip to Bécancour a truly memorable part of your summer or fall vacation!

DAY 1

Start your day at the **Musée de la biodiversité du Québec**. This science museum is the perfect place to learn more about the region's flora and fauna through interactive and immersive exhibits. You'll also meet some friendly local wildlife, such as raccoons and deer. Guided tours and educational activities help deepen your understanding of biodiversity and why ecosystem conservation matters. This museum is always a hit with families and nature lovers alike!

Next, treat yourself to lunch and a bit of shopping at **La Maison de Bibi** (café, gourmet shop and handmade soap). Their breakfast, popular among locals, is served until 2 p.m. Like to have lunch to go? You can pre-order a lunch box 24 hours in advance and enjoy it beside the St. Lawrence River. Before you leave, be sure to stock up on some lovingly handcrafted bath and body care products made by Bibi and her team.



Then make your way to the **Quai de Sainte-Angèle**, just steps from La Maison de Bibi. It's an ideal place to take a break, watch the boats pass on the river and maybe even see some local fishers reeling in a good catch. Depending on when you visit, you might also get to enjoy live performances at the Quai en fête concert series—check the schedule!

From there, take a drive along the Route des Navigateurs to soak up some of the sights. You may have already noticed one of the interpretive panels near the observation tower on the wharf. Other panels can be found at the Bécancour Tourist Information Centre and at the Saint-Angèle-de-Laval rest stop—a great place to stretch your legs and take in the view.

After a full day, head to **Auberge Godefroy** for dinner and an overnight stay. Treat yourself to a fine dining experience at the inn's renowned restaurant, known for its impressive wine list. Enjoy your meal or a refreshing cocktail out on the sunny terrace. In summer, catch the lively Soirées chansonniers, musical evenings held on more than 40 nights throughout the season. Before turning in, unwind at Espace Aqua-Détente, the hotel's four-season wellness area featuring luxurious indoor and outdoor facilities.



Kick off your day with a guided tour of the **Moulin Michel de Gentilly!** This fascinating heritage site offers a unique "Miller for a Day" experience every second Sunday, where you can mill your own bag of flour to take home. Don't miss the on-site bakery—you'll want to pick up a tasty rustic loaf. Visiting in July? Check out the 5th edition of the Blues et Gin Festival, held right on-site.

For lunch, head to **La Roulotte à Patate de Gentilly!** A local favourite among poutine lovers, this roadside stand is a must for a quick and tasty bite. There are also vegetarian, gluten-free, lactose-free and health-conscious options. The Roulotte's charm and eco-friendly practices make it a perfect stop for any traveller exploring Bécancour.



In the afternoon, make your way to the **Parc régional de la rivière Gentilly** to work off that hearty meal. With over 25 km of hiking and mountain biking trails, this peaceful natural setting is perfect for those beautiful summer days. The park also has more than 14 rental cabins, campsites and ready-to-camp options. Horseback riders will love Le Petit Trot, a rest area with 16 spaces to accommodate riders and their horses.

Tonight's dinner is at **Ô Quai des Brasseurs**. This popular microbrewery serves up a bistro-style menu, has a dog-friendly patio and boasts spectacular views of the St. Lawrence River. Top off your day with one of their famous craft beers.

Then it's back to Auberge Godefroy for your second night.

Spend the morning strolling through the **Parc écologique Godefroy**, where children will be thrilled by the magical creatures hidden along the trail.



Before heading home, stop by the **Marché Godefroy** to stock up on some tasty local fare as a reminder of your visit to beautiful Bécancour. All season long, visitors can enjoy both indoor and outdoor seating areas, and a grassy picnic space for families. There's also a free program of events on weekends including live music and culinary workshops.

Don't miss the Tournée de la Saint-François, a scenic route that runs alongside the Rivière Saint-François, with great stops to make along the way.

DAY 1

Get off to an active start at **Extéria**, an aerial rope course. Have fun playing in the treetops with obstacle courses, ziplines, rope bridges and more! There are two circuits—Petite aventure (ages 7 and up) and Grande aventure (12 and up)—so there's something for everyone. Whether you come with family, with friends, as a couple or on your own, a fun and thrilling time is guaranteed.

For lunch, swing by a local grocery store for some picnic items, then head to **Parc des Voltigeurs**. Kick back and relax in this vast green space. Still feeling active? Try your hand at the disc golf course.

Next, head to **Centre de divertissement Laser Force**. More fun awaits with glow-in-the-dark mini golf, a giant play structure and adrenaline-pumping laser tag. Get ready to unleash your inner child and spark some friendly competition.

After this action-packed day, head downtown to **L'Établi Brasserie Urbaine** for dinner. You'll find a varied menu, a spacious 150-seat patio and live music every Friday and Saturday. It's the ideal place to unwind and enjoy a great meal in a vibrant atmosphere.

After dinner, take a stroll through downtown and stop by **Parc Woodyatt** to enjoy the magnificent view of the Rivière Saint-François.



Then settle in for a good night's sleep at a hotel or campground:

Spend the morning at the **Village Québecois d'Antan**, a truly one-of-a-kind destination in Quebec. Step into a historical village and experience everyday life as it was in 19th and 20th century Quebec. Explore more than 70 heritage buildings, meet lively costumed characters and let the kids cool off in the splash park. Plan to stay the whole day to make the most of everything the Village has to offer. A variety of tasty dining options and snack bars are available on-site. Return at nightfall to experience the Village Parallèle and see the site illuminated in a whole new way.



After this fun-filled day, head to downtown Drummondville for a bite to eat. Dining in the city centre is always a great choice—especially in summer, when the patios are festive and buzzing with energy.

Start your third day by visiting **DRAC**, a contemporary art centre featuring current artistic practices, located inside the Maison des arts Desjardins Drummondville. You'll be impressed by the quality of its exhibitions and public programs.





Next, make your way to the **Drummondville public market**, a must-see stop where you can explore many local flavours. Open year-round and located in the heart of downtown, the market brings together local farmers, producers and food artisans with fresh, flavourful fare made with passion. There's no better place to find unique local products, meet friendly vendors and pick up some delicious treats to enjoy on the road—or to bring back home!

While you're there, grab a snack to enjoy during a walk in the **Réserve naturelle du Boisé-de-la-Marconi**. The trails are peaceful, accessible to all and wheelchair-friendly, making this green space a great attraction for all.



This getaway takes you to the beautiful Nicolet-Yamaska area in Centre-du-Québec, where living history meets local flavours. Along the St. Lawrence River, picture-perfect countryside views invite you to pause, take it all in and capture the moment.

DAY 1

Start your first day by exploring the region with the Nicolet-Yamaska audio tours. These five GPS-guided circuits lead you to local treasures, each narrated with anecdotes, historical facts and personal stories that bring the sites to life. The narrators share their knowledge and experiences to help you connect more deeply with the region's heritage and culture. Download the BaladoDiscovery app and let it lead the way!

Next stop is **Hôtel Montfort**, where an afternoon of pampering awaits you at the Nordic spa. Hot and cold baths, a sauna, massage therapy, outdoor fireplace and enchanting surroundings come together for total relaxation.



For dinner, the hotel's restaurant serves up delicious seasonal dishes made with local ingredients, all in a warm, welcoming atmosphere—perfect for any appetite, big or small.

Spend a comfortable night at this peaceful hotel, surrounded by nature and a wide range of outdoor activities. Paddleboarding, canoeing, biking and hiking are all available on-site, with equipment provided for hotel guests.



Today you'll visit **Maison et atelier Rodolphe-Duguay**, one of the region's most beautiful 19th century ancestral homes. Step into the artistic world of painter and engraver Rodolphe Duguay, and his wife, author Jeanne L'Archevêque.

Continue on to the **Musée des cultures du monde**—and be sure to see the featured exhibition, "La poutine, une culture à toutes les sauces", until September 2025. The museum is open daily and features a charming craft boutique at the entrance.



Come lunchtime or dinner, settle in at **Microbrasserie La Flûte à Bec**, a local favourite in Nicolet. Great beer, friendly vibes and tasty dishes make it a relaxing spot with a great atmos-phere where you can enjoy a leisurely meal.

Now it's time to get moving! Choose one of the six certified **Route Bleue** paddle routes to enjoy some kayaking or paddleboarding. These well-marked circuits guide you safely through some scenic waterways of the region, including the Lac-Saint-Pierre World Biosphere Reserve. Drift to the rhythm of the water and savour the moment.

End the day with another delicious meal at the **Hôtel Montfort** restaurant, and spend a second night at the hotel.

Begin your last day with a morning walk through the **Parc écomaritime de l'Anse-du-Port**. Stunning in every season, it's especially beautiful in summer at sunrise and sunset. Raised wooden boardwalks and an observation tower overlooking the St. Lawrence River make for an unforgettable start to the day.

Then head to the **Musée des Abénakis**, Quebec's first Indigenous museum. Open since 1965, it vividly tells the story of the W8banaki Nation. The new permanent exhibition—W8banakiak—bears witness to the ancestral legacy of this resilient People. Their ways of being, knowing, speaking and doing are conveyed through sight, touch and even smell. Before you leave, be sure to visit the gift shop and take a stroll along the Sentier Tolba.






At lunchtime, make your way to **Saint-Zéphirin-de Courval**. With over 50 km of bike-friendly routes, safe shoulders, rest areas and repair stations, the area is very popular among cyclists. Enjoy a picnic in the rolling countryside or stop at a local restaurant.

Tourisme Odanak



Visit Odanak, a culturally significant site in Centredu-Québec that bears witness to the W8banaki traditions. This Indigenous land, known for its natural beauty, offers stunning forest landscapes and riverfront views.



Odanak stands out for its deep commitment to preserving its heritage, with institutions such as the **Musée des Abénakis**— Quebec's first Indigenous museum. The community proudly upholds its ancestral traditions, including Abenaki basketry, a craft passed down through the generations that you can learn about during your visit.





Be sure to explore the **Sentier Tolba**, a walking trail next to the museum. Interpretive panels along the trail explain about the local flora and fauna and their place in the community's Indigenous knowledge and traditions.

Stay overnight at the **Abenaki Aventure** campground amid magnificent forest surroundings to extend your cultural experience. Don't miss the "Stories and Legends" activity (upon reservation – \$) in which fascinating tales from the community's oral history are told around a campfire.

Add some outdoor fun to your stay by paddling along the **Route Bleue** or cycling a local section of the **Route Verte**. Take advantage of "Vélo sur la rivière", a pontoon shuttle service that takes visitors and their bikes across the Rivière Saint-François—an original way to enjoy the scenic surroundings of Odanak.

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

HIT THE ROAD ON ROUTE DES NAVIGATEURS

Sample delicious local produce, take in peaceful riverside vistas, learn about our rich history, discover our flora and fauna—these are just some of the things you can do along the Route des Navigateurs.

Starting at St-François-du-Lac (Centre-du-Québec), this tourist route also crosses the Chaudière-Appalaches and Bas-Saint-Laurent tourist regions.

IN CENTRE-DU-QUEBEC, EXPLORE THE AREA WITH A FUN DIGITAL CIRCUIT INCLUDING 13 STOPS AND COVERING 112 KM

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This tourist route through the L'Érable region brings you a burst of colour with its stunning scenery, varied activities and local flavours. Nestled at the foot of the Appalachians, the area is a favourite among cyclists looking for a challenge and rolling country roads.

DAY 1

Start your morning on two wheels! Cycling in the **region of L'Érable** means gliding through tunnels of trees and taking in scenic views stretching over 50 km. Cruise along riverbanks on flatter terrain or take on the hill climbs at the gateway to the Appalachians. The region also has a linear cycling park with rest stops along 77 km of trails (a section of Route Verte No. 1) that pass through the heart of several municipalities.

After all that pedalling, take a well-earned break for lunch at a local restaurant.

In the afternoon, meet some of the people behind the region's great products. Visit a variety of local farmers and producers (maple, berries, microbrewery beers, cured meats and more). Then head outdoors to enjoy your activity of choice: hiking, fishing, golfing or relaxing on one of the area's navigable lakes.



Next head to Parc régional des **Grandes-Coulées** for more outdoor fun. Spanning over 12 km, this easy walking trail is ideal for the whole family—and leashed dogs are welcome too! Other activities include an obstacle course (18 modules woven through the forest), fishing (30 pools stocked with speckled trout), trail biking, birdwatching and mushroom foraging.

Enjoy camping? Stay overnight at Parc régional des Grandes-Coulées. The park offers four rustic campsites, one shelter and three new ready-tocamp units nestled in the old-growth forest.





Begin your second day in the charming **municipality of Inverness**. Stop by the public market (open on Saturday mornings in summer) and stroll through the open-air gallery—a perfect blend of local culture, regional flavours and the great outdoors.

For lunch, enjoy a picnic at the magnificent **Parc des Chutes Lysander**. Set in a majestic forest beside the soothing sound of waterfalls, this spot is perfect for a peaceful break, whether you're travelling solo or with family. Two scenic lookouts offer breathtaking views of the falls, and a one-kilometre trail runs along the park's edge. Kids will love the obstacle course modules and play area.

In the afternoon, visit the **Musée du Bronze d'Inverness**. Their new exhibition "Riopelle, le sculpteur" features works that tell the story of Quebec's bronze foundry tradition from historical, cultural, artistic and technical perspectives. Afterward, hit the **Les Coulées** trail, a 3-km loop that starts just behind the museum. The trail begins with a magnificent view of the region, before leading you into the calm of nature.

Other places to stay nearby:

Evening activity:

If you're visiting in summer, spend an evening at the **Biergarten de L'Île** in Plessisville, open Thursday and Friday evenings from June to September, 4 to 11 p.m. Enjoy a festive atmosphere with local beers on tap, outdoor firepits and BBQs available for visitors who'd like to bring their own picnic. A great way to end your day!

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This itinerary runs through the Arthabaska region, bringing you to Victoriaville and the surrounding area—home of many talented food artisans, fascinating historic sites, lively outdoor playgrounds and great places to dine and stay the night.

DAY 1



Start your getaway with a scenic hike on **Mont Gleason** in Tingwick. While best known as a popular family ski hill, Mont Gleason is open year-round and hosts various events in all seasons.

If you're visiting in the fall, don't miss the "Gleason en couleurs" weekends. Then, on October 23, the "Gastronomie & Après-ski" event brings Chef Danny St-Pierre and four other restaurateurs together for a high-end culinary experience you won't forget. Dinner this evening is at **Wick Station** in the heart of Warwick. Enjoy the full, flavourful menu made with no fried food, and a selection of microbrewery beers. The 70-seat patio is a great place to unwind and enjoy live music on Friday nights in summer.





Spend the night at **Aux plaisirs partagés**, a welcoming, family-run B&B with comfortable rooms and a handy location right by the bike trail. The breakfast is a highlight—and the setting makes it easy to explore Warwick and its surroundings on two wheels.



Kick off day two at **Un goût de miel** in Sainte-Clotilde-de-Horton. Take part in the workshop "Une ruche, comment ça marche?" and learn how a beehive works. Then, browse the shop and sample a wide variety of hive-based products. It's the perfect blend of nature, learning and local flavours.

Stay for lunch with a picnic by the river. Pre-order a lunch box from Un goût de miel and enjoy it in the heart of nature beside the site's gentle waterfalls.

In the afternoon, visit **Miellerie King – Distillerie & Hydromellerie**. Sample some exceptional honey-based products, including a range of distilled spirits, meads and honey wines—all made on-site, from bee to bottle!

Don't miss their signature creation Alvéole – La Crème, Quebec's only honey-based cream liqueur made with real cream.

Next, head to **Parc Marie-Victorin** in Kingsey Falls, to visit a lush botanical garden. Discover giant 3D mosaicultures, a wide variety of plants, a carnivorous plant greenhouse and a fun new exhibit that unravels the mysteries of insect-eating plants. The park features seven themed gardens and a new museum showcasing Quebec's rich cultural heritage.

End your day back at the B&B for dinner and a restful night.

Today is all about getting active! Start strong with a hike on the **Sentiers des Trotteurs**. You might choose the "Sentier du Pic", just under 10 km, or explore the "Sentier des Cascades", which takes about two hours to complete. Both trails start at Sainte-Hélène-de-Chester. Looking for more of a challenge? The Trottier-Arthabaska trail runs for 26 km, winding through several municipalities in the Arthabaska region. Along the way you'll find scenic viewpoints and varied elevations—ideal for enthusiastic hikers while still accessible to many.



For lunch, ask your B&B hosts to prepare a tasty picnic to go.

After this full day outdoors, treat yourself to dinner at a local restaurant before settling down for one last night at the inn.



Your last day starts with a short walk in the **Parc du Mont Arthabaska**, located halfway between the St. Lawrence plains and the Appalachian Mountains. You'll find over 12 km of trails and a lookout at the summit offering breathtaking views of Victoriaville. The park also features 15 km of mountain biking trails for riders of all levels. The best part? It's all free!

Grab lunch at the mountaintop bistro—perfect for refuelling before you hit the road again.



After your meal, visit the **Musée Laurier** in Victoriaville, where you'll learn about the life of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his wife in their elegant Victorian-era home. Every Friday and Saturday from June 27 to August 30, spoil yourself with an authentic "English tea" (upon reservation), sit back and take in the charming period atmosphere. On Sundays from July to September, join the brand-new guided outdoor tour or explore the free outdoor exhibition in the "Parcours Culture Nature". While you're there, stop by the nearby Musée de l'Hôtel des Postes to discover the fascinating world of early 20th century postal services.

Then head to the **Centre d'art Jacques-et-Miche-Auger**. This is a contemporary visual and media arts centre located inside Victoriaville's cultural hub, Le Carré 150. A free, accessible venue, the Centre is more than an exhibition space—it's a place for discovery, connection and cultural activities. Visitors can relax, create, chat, learn, play and consult books.

Visiting in the fall? Don't miss **La Balade Gourmande**, which celebrates its 25th anniversary this year! Taking place on October 4–5 and 11–12, this popular agritourism event is an invitation to explore the region's flavours. You can meet over 40 local producers and food artisans offering free tastings, and visit more than 125 exhibitors in eight public markets. This free event is spread across six well-marked circuits that you can explore at your own pace.

Afternoon & Evening Activity:

To round out your stay, take in a show at **Salle Kingsey**, a performance hall with a varied program that runs year-round. In summer, the focus is on theatre and comedy, including the hit play *Cougar qui peut!* and the comedy show *Les Exséparables*, which also has an afternoon matinee performance. Expect warm hospitality and a great atmosphere.
